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FROM THE CEO

Quick Review of the Wonderful 2020

"2021 can't get here soon enough!" — Everybody

Let's not mince words — 2020 was a rough year. We have been through a historic time and have seen our share of challenges, but the saying of "this too shall pass" serves as a reminder that better days are ahead. Obviously, the pandemic dominated in 2020, but I wanted to touch on a few things that happened at DSO this past year.

New Metering System

We finished replacing our metering system this year. The new metering system provides us with more timely information on outages and power quality data that we did not have before.

Residential Peak Reduction Rate

After offering a pilot program for residential peak reduction for three years, we finally offered an official residential peak reduction electric rate. Just under 200 members signed up for

the rate this year.

With this rate, we turn off members' power when our power supplier, Kansas Electric Power Cooperative (KEPCo), notifies us of a peak event. In total, we only shut off power four times in 2020. In return for allowing us to turn off their power, members received a \$25 incentive for each kW saved and were not subject to the higher Red Zone rates. On average, members on this rate saw a benefit of \$120, compared to members on the regular Red Zone residential electric rate.

Financials

Once the pandemic took hold and the governor ordered delays in disconnecting meters for nonpaying members, and the counties were instituting stay-athome orders, there was concern about how we would be financially affected.

2021 Board Election Process Begins

I hope you were able to enjoy the Thanksgiving season with some family and friends, while still staying safe. If you were like me, one of the things to be thankful for was the end of the elections and the constant political ads. The democratic process of voting is important, but after a while election fatigue sets in.

The democratic process is also important as a DSO member. Cooperative Principle 2 is Democratic Member Control and it states that cooperatives are organizations controlled by their members who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. This active participation is accomplished by electing directors every year as part of the DSO annual member meeting in early April.

April 2021 seems far away right now, but preparations are already starting for director elections. The board recently approved a policy to inform members which director positions are up for election and whether the current director is eligible and plans to run. In April 2021, Director Position 1 in each of the three districts is up for election, the Director At-Large Position is up for election, and the Director Position 3 in the West District is currently vacant and will be up for election to fill that vacancy. Directors must reside within the DSO territory they represent. The following information is being supplied to all members to fulfill the new policy on director positions up for election:

▶ THE EAST DISTRICT is all territory east of Highway K-15 and DAVID BUTLER is the current

- director in Position 1. Butler is eligible for another three-year term and plans to run again.
- ▶ THE WEST DISTRICT is all territory west of I-135/U.S. Highway 81 and KEN HEDBERG is the current director in Position 1. Hedberg is eligible for another three-year term and plans to run again. Director Position 3 has been vacant since April 2020 as the previous director did not seek re-election and no other member completed the nomination process to be placed on the ballot.
- ► THE CENTRAL DISTRICT is all territory between the East and West districts and DANE CLARK is the current director in Position 1. Clark is eligible for another three-year term and plans to run again.
- ► THE AT-LARGE POSITION is all DSO territory and **DEAN ALLISON** is the current director in the Director At-Large Position. Allison is eligible for another three-year term and plans to run again. All potential directors, new or current, must complete the nomination process of obtaining member signatures on a petition to be placed on the official ballot. Petition packets are available at the DSO office in Solomon and must be completed and returned by the date shown in the packets.

Remember, democratic member control only happens if members actively participate by placing their names on the ballot and voting on qualified directors. Directors are expected to attend meetings and training sessions to become knowledgeable about the industry and are compensated for their time and expenses to attend meetings and training sessions. Contact the DSO office or any current director if you have questions about the director positions.

Fortunately, we were only slightly affected. We saw our commercial energy sales go down and our residential sales go up. Overall, our revenues were down for the year, but we finished in decent financial shape.

It is important to know that we avoided financial problems because you continued to pay your electric bill on time. That allowed us to pay our bills on time. I want to thank all of you for that.

Solar

Our energy contract with KEPCo provides us with the opportunity to secure up to 5% of our energy load from a renewable energy resource, like wind or solar. We investigated this opportunity and ultimately secured a 25-year agreement to purchase 2 MW of solar power from a solar company. To accommodate the solar generating systems (each 1 MW), we secured land in the Lindsborg and Junction City

areas. The solar generating units are set to be installed in early 2021 and should be operational by June. With these two units in place, we project to save over \$300,000 annually on our power costs.
