Our COVID-19 Plan

As I write this, we are now in week four of the COVID-19 pandemic. Normally at this time of year, I am writing about our recently completed annual meeting. But that meeting, and others like it across the state and country, was canceled due to the pandemic. (It may be rescheduled for a later date, but that will be decided later.) So instead of recapping the annual meeting, I will briefly explain how we are handling the pandemic situation at DS&O.

On March 16, the board of directors and staff met to discuss our COVID-19 plan. The plan included closing our doors to the public (you can still reach us by phone or email) and working with minimal staff. In addition, we instituted social distancing measures like keeping office doors closed and eliminating in-person employee interactions. Our linemen were paired-up to work on meter installations and a variety of maintenance projects. To date, the plan has worked well, and we have been able to maintain our responsiveness to our

members and ensure reliable electricity.

As you know, this whole pandemic situation changes on a daily and even hourly level. As a result, we are extra vigilant of the various local, state and national rules, laws, and orders that affect our business. One such change was Governor Kelly's order to not disconnect meters for non-payment until the Kansas State of Disaster Emergency expires or through May 1, whichever is earlier. Because of the economic impact the pandemic has created, we anticipate we will have more than the usual number of non-payments in May. Please know that we want to help you get your account current and will try to find a payment plan we can both make work. If you need to talk with us about your account, just give us a call.

Finally, we have enclosed the 2019 annual report in this month's newsletter. Please let us know if you have any questions about the report and please stay safe and healthy.



Minutes of the Annual Meeting of Members of

The 80th Annual Meeting of Members of DS&O Electric Cooperative, Inc. was held at the Webster Conference Center in Salina, Kansas, on April 2, 2019.

Dinner was served by Ricky's Café (Hanover) to 317 attendees.

Pastor Justin Panzer from Faith Lutheran Church in Abilene opened the meeting with prayer.

Communications Manager Derrick Rutherford gave away door prizes throughout the meeting.

President James Christopher welcomed the members and introduced the board of directors and their spouses to the membership. President Christopher presented Doug Lindahl with a plaque and thanked him for his 15 years of serving as director for the cooperative.

Mr. Christopher introduced other guests in attendance, which included: Suzanne Lane, executive vice president/CEO of Kansas Electric Power Cooperative (KEPCo); Terry Deutscher, manager of SCADA & Meter Maintenance also of KEPCo; Vicki Estes, director of communications for

Kansas Electric Cooperatives; and Tyler Mason representing Congressman Roger Marshall from the 1st District.

President Christopher called the meeting to order at 6:37 p.m. and asked for a report of quorum from Secretary Ken Hedberg. Mr. Hedberg reported that a quorum was present and read the official notice of meeting. There were 153 members present and in person. President Christopher declared a quorum was present.

Mr. Christopher then stated that a copy of the minutes of the April 3, 2018, annual meeting was included with the annual report, which was mailed to all members. A motion was passed to dispense with the reading of the minutes and approve the minutes of the 2018 annual meeting as printed and distributed. Secretary Hedberg reviewed DS&O's 2018 financials, which were printed in the annual report.

For his president's report, Mr. Christopher encouraged the membership to use the DS&O website as a resource for information about their electric cooperative. Mr.

Christopher reviewed the "About Us" tab giving an overview of the cooperative's history, strategic plan, and the seven cooperative principals. Mr. Christopher also talked about the development of the cooperative's core values and how they were developed with the member in mind. He then read the vision and mission statement to the members.

Tim Power, CEO, thanked the members for attending. Mr. Power gave a presentation on the cost to serve and more specifically how power costs make up 57% of the total cost to serve. He stated that DS&O has been able to save on its power costs by operating generators during summer peak hours. Mr. Power encouraged members to reduce peak and save money by enrolling in the residential peak shaving rate, which will be available to all regular residential rate customers in 2019.

Mr. Power introduced Mrs. Lane who discussed power supply and the things KEPCo is doing to try and keep their rates stable. Mrs. Lane thanked Director

Electrical Safety: What Your Teen Should Know

Parents of teens can relate: You want to share important information with your teen but he or she braces for the next lecture. Your teen may give you the quintessential eye roll, but sharing the following safety information could help save his or her life.

So when the time is right, relay this information to your teenager to prevent electrical shock.

At Home

- Do not use a cell phone near the bathtub or sink or with wet hands while it is plugged in and charging. Do not use an extension cord in the bathroom to extend your phone's reach closer to the tub. Teens have died after a charging phone dropped into bath water.
- Do not sleep with your charging cell phone under your pillow or in bed with you. The phone can overheat, causing bedding to catch on fire or burns to the skin. Also, a short in the charging cord can cause electrical shock when you are using your phone. This is especially a risk when using generic or incompatible charging equipment. Always replace charging equipment with brand name/matching items. They cost more, but they are less likely to malfunction.
- Do not charge your cell phone, tablet or other devices on soft surfaces such as a blanket, pillow or bedding.

On the Road

- THIS ADVICE CAN SAVE YOUR TEEN'S LIFE: If you are in an accident involving a downed power line or damaged padmount transformer or other electrical equipment, DO NOT get out of your car. Call 911, warn others to say away and to wait for assistance.
- Only exit if there is smoke or your car is on fire. If that is

- the case, make a solid jump out of the vehicle without touching the car and hop with feet together as far as you can. DO NOT WALK. If there is damaged power equipment, the ground and anything else the lines touch could have electrical current running through it.
- If you approach an accident with a downed power line, DO NOT attempt to help the victims and do not go near the scene. Instead, call 911 and warn others not to approach the area.

Outside

- Do not use plugged in devices (e.g. a charging cell phone) near water like a pool or hot tub or in damp conditions.
- Sometimes electrical currents can leak into water and can cause electric shock drowning. If you feel odd sensations in a wading pool, hot tub or swimming pool, get out. If you are swimming in a lake and feel odd sensations in your body, such as tingling or zaps, swim away from the dock or other source of electricity (e.g. lights).

In the Dorm Room

- Do not hang decorative light strands with metal tacks or nails.
- Do not overload outlets or extension cords.
- Do not run extension cords under a rug or use them if they are frayed or cracked.
- ▶ Use extension cords with care, they are for temporary
- Use reputable laboratory-tested cords.
- ▶ Only use appliances allowed by your dorm/campus. Although you can't cover all these tips with your teen in one sitting, they are important to convey and could prevent injuries and save lives.
